All enjoyed the Christmas story from the Bible with giant visual aids, a tasty lunch of rice, beef, and cabbage, and each received an article of clothing & a small toy as a gift. Most important was the personal attention & love showered on the kids by the International Team!

Preliminary steps to open office/programs in Gulu District

Sister Mariam worked through the latter part of the year getting ECM registered in the Gulu District and investigating where we might place our



office to oversee the work there. We are thrilled to have Mariam on the team to build up the work in northern Uganda where so many children have experienced such trauma during the war there.



Launching of Ministry to Children with Albinism



In Africa children born with the genetic condition known as albinism have a very rough time. Their skin is prone to sores and cancers, their eyes are excruciatingly sensitive to light, and they are often ostracized from society, considered a curse. In some places, witch doctors ask for their body parts to make what they believe is very powerful medicine. This has resulted in many albinos being murdered and dismembered.

ECM's plan is to collect sunglasses, eyeglass cases, sun screen lotion and wide brimmed hats and to give them out as practical gifts to show our love and concern to albino children. We have developed practical teaching to help them, their parents, and their teachers to view them in a more positive light. We plan a public awareness campaign to work for fuller public acceptance and to work against harmful misconceptions.

Character Building from the Bible Ministry for Public Schools



ECM's public school ministry continued in 2008, and more schools were added from the Agave area of the Volta Region following the American team's summer ministry there.



Initiative against shrine slavery

Throughout the year, ECM continued its initiative against shrine slavery. Serious negotiations for the liberation of another shrine looked promising throughout the year but did not come to a conclusion. Meanwhile the summer team did intensive personal visitation and showed the Jesus film in the Agave area where some slaves have been freed and three shrines continue to hold women and girls in ritual servitude. The woman pictured at the right welcomed the team to talk, but refused the Gospel, insisting she had already given herself to Satan.

We continued working on public consciousness and opinion by creating and maintaining various websites devoted to disseminating accurate information about the practice.



New life for former shrine slaves



The team visits Abiwu Awusi, a former trokosi slave who has taken a firm stand for Christ. ECM counselor–teachers Judith and Mary continued to visit, evangelize, teach and help those freed in past liberations, bringing healing and hope to those whose lives have been fractured by slavery.

Evangelism in idol shrines



Lorella and the summer team made contact with numerous shrines and shared the Gospel with several priests and priestesses. Above: An initial contact with three mamissi (mermaid spirit devotees). The main points of surprise seem to be that God desires and demands our worship and does not share His worship with the lesser gods or spirits. Some are seriously considering the Gospel message. Our goal is to share a serious, detailed presentation of the Gospel in each of the shrines of the areas where we work, and to continue building a relationship with the priests and devotees as long as they will listen in a friendly manner.

We also worked throughout the year to develop appropriate teaching materials designed to meet the spiritual needs of those devoted to idol shrines and to make the Gospel as clear as possible to them. Although we continue to refine our materials, we believe we are moving in the right direction.

Street Ministry & Vocational Training for Street Youth



Felicia Annan (above) continued to serve capably as Director of Street Ministries. About 150 children were served weekly at the Kantamanto Railway Station and at Agblobloshie Market. The ministry included a weekly meal, first aid and health attention,

Bible teaching, counseling, and games.

Grace Quansah finished her vocational training in hairdressing and ECM assisted her in setting up her own salon. Two young men are nearing completion of their training as well.

Haven of Hope



In 2008 Haven of Hope was home to 46 children who were orphaned, abandoned, abused, homeless on the street or rescued from idol shrines. Staff and missionaries work together to provide a safe haven and a loving home for the children and to train them to love and serve Christ.

Haven of Hope Academy



Haven Academy now serves the educationally disadvantaged from Nursery through 6th grade. Ashley Ducommun finished the 2007-2008 academic year there. Lindsay Hendrix and Elise Messner are serving as teachers for the 2008-2009 school year. We still face many challenges, but the children are making great strides in English and reading and are exposed to a host of enrichment activities throughout the year. During 2008, Haven Academy served 82 children from Haven of Hope home and from the local community.



Arrival of Driscolls, Gowins as long-term missionaries

We were encouraged with the arrival of our first long-term missionaries in Ghana. Jim & Carolyn Driscoll, along with Jere & Ruth Ann Gowin, began work at Haven of Hope in October. The Gowins will also be involved in Muslim evangelism in the north.



Hope & Healing in Togo & Benin

Teacher training in Cotonou, Bohicon



Lois Pope and Hazel Hermosillo accompanied Lorella to Benin in May. The team trained children's teachers—in the south at Cotonou and further north near the seat of the ancient Dahomey Empire at a town named Bohicon just outside of Abomey. Some former vodun priest attended the seminars and gave us their stories.

Evangelism in Idol Shrines around Bohicon & Abomey



Benin abounds in vodun idols and shrines. We made contact with numerous shrines, left Gospel literature at many, and were able to share the Gospel in some depth at a shrine-filled village called Cana. There the chiefs, elders and several priests and priestesses listened intently to the Gospel and asked our team to come back. The village is being followed up through the efforts of nationals.

Hope & Healing in Congo

Our International Directors did not get to DR Congo in 2008, They were advised by the staff that it was too dangerous to come because of the war there. And our staff in Congo do not have digital cameras, so we have no new pictures from 2008 from Congo. However, reports were received regularly and all our programs continued despite the devastating effects of the war.

Leadership training

Our two African Leadership Training Centers continued training leaders for children's ministry — one in Kinshasa and one at Mission Garizim in the interior.

Sunday schools for children

Graduates of our training continued teaching Sunday school in towns and villages throughout the Bandundu Province, Kasai Provinces, and Kinshasa. Almost 258,000 children are now receiving weekly training in Sunday schools started by ECM

Orphan aid

Sponsorship programs are underway in Kikwit and in a small way in Kinshasa. This helps provide educational and nutritional support for sponsored orphans.

Street children

The street child ministry has continued to be very active. We had to give up the gardening project in Kinshasa because the land owner was no longer willing to make a plot available. We also had to give up our Sunday services at the University. All other aspects of the program were very active, including sports, literacy, Bible teaching, and nutritional support.

Vocational training & vocational startup for street youth

Four street youth graduated from training and ECM assisted them in starting small businesses in small groups. One group of young men is now jointly operating a carpentry shop, while a group of young women have joined together as tailors. Their success is a great encouragement

to all of us at ECM.

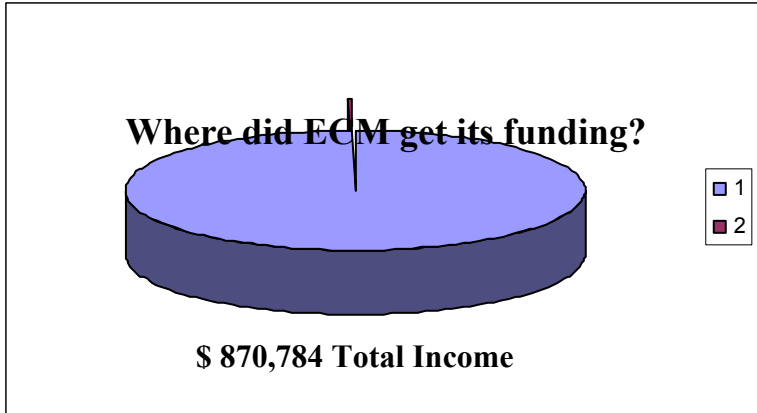
Hope & Healing at Mission Central—Serious Progress



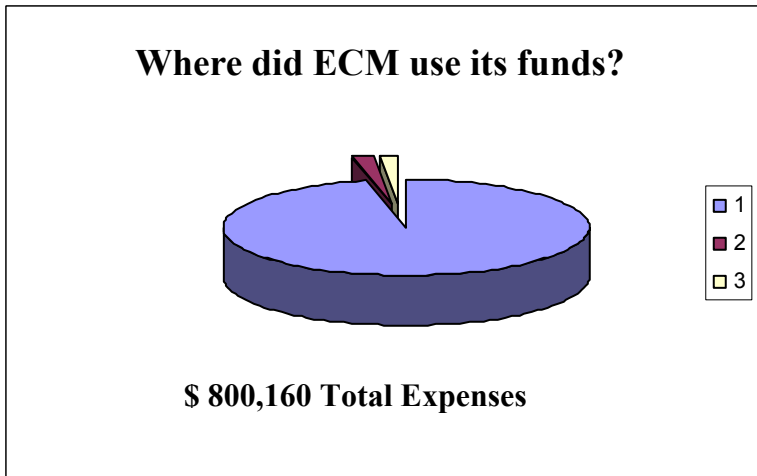

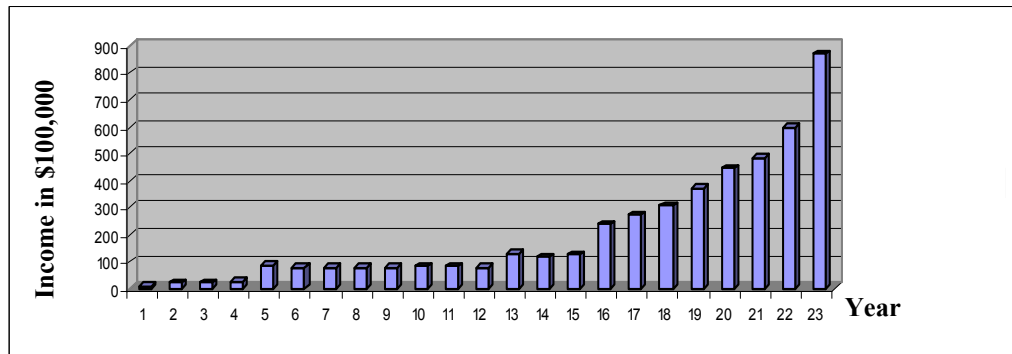
